It is always my aim in these circumstances to make a decision prior to 7.30am unless circumstances changes unexpectedly following this time.

On a more positive note I am pleased to report that two people have been convicted of the vandalism which we suffered last term. Neither was a current or former student of St Ivo.

# **Rotary Young Chef Competition**

The Rotary competition took place on Monday 15th January. Seven year 10 pupils took part and worked really hard in order to cook a two course meal for two people for under £10 in two hours.

The competition was judged by three professional chefs with many years experience within the industry. Ian Cousins was at the University Arms in Cambridge before becoming Centre Manager at the St Ives Recreation Centre. Dom Hall is a past pupil of St Ivo; he has worked at the Old Bridge in Huntingdon, with Gordon Ramsey in London and is presently chef at the Crown at Broughton. The third judge was Dick Forway who was previously a chef in the Royal Navy before teaching catering at C.R.C.

The competition was won by **Tarnia** (**10Kg**), who cooked a Chinese stir-fry followed by a fruit fool. The second place was awarded to **Mehmet** (**10Ms**) who impressed the judges with his chicken and vegetable main course followed by a tahini pastry dessert. Third place went to **Nicola** who made grilled salmon with potatoes and vegetables, followed by a fruit fool.

Tarnia attended the regional final in Stamford on Saturday 10th February (age 14-19) and she succeeded in coming 5th out of 19. Competitors also included catering students. She did exceptionally well. Congratulations!

## **Music Department News**


