SPARE SEATS FOR PURCHASE ON SCHOOL BUSES

Under Cambridgeshire's Home to School Transport Policy, pupils who are not eligible for free transport may be allowed to pay to travel on existing buses contracted to the County Council, if seats are available.

With effect from 16 February 2009 parents can apply to purchase spare seats for the Summer Term, 2009.

The cost is £120 per term for a return journey ticket or £60 for a one-way journey or for half a term. This represents excellent value, equating to £1.89 per day when averaged out over the school year.

Seats are available on a termly or half-termly, 'first come, first served' basis. Please note that buses cannot deviate from their existing routes/timetables.

A trip to the Black Country museum is being planned for June 2009 as part of their study of the Industrial Revolution. Details will be given to all classes shortly.

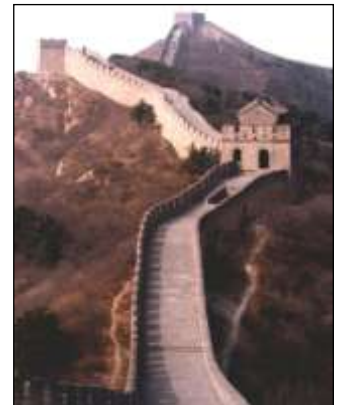


Year 9

Year 11

Year 11 are working hard towards their GCE examinations. The Chief Examiner for History from Edexcel will be coming in on Wednesday 25th March to deliver a revision workshop. From Thursday 26th February booster sessions will be run every Thursday in the department from 3-3.45pm for C/D borderline students, and for those seeking to get an A* grade.

Year 12

Year 12 students are looking forward to the department's first trip to Berlin as part of the new AS module: Germany 1933-63. This will include an introductory tour of the city centre, Brandenburg Gate, Potsdamer Platz, Göring's Air Ministry, Topography of Terror (former SS and Gestapo HQ), Neue Synagogue, and northern Mitte (a preserved pre-war Jewish area), Sachsenhausen Concentration camp, the stadium built by the Nazis for the 1936 Olympic Games, and Wansee Villa where the 1942 conference decided upon the 'Final Solution' against the Jews.

These books will be very valuable in lessons, helping students to become aware of the interesting local history of St. Ives and the surrounding villages.

2009 at St Ivo School has been unofficially named the 'Year of Social Responsibility' and the students have shown they are very capable of making this official! The school has gained *silver status* as an eco-school and we are well on the way to gaining *gold status*.

The Big Tidy Up: A significant drop in litter after break and lunch times has been evident. New bins have been distributed throughout the site, and these will soon carry our eco-ivo logo to remind us to keep binning our rubbish. Hopefully a cleaner site will encourage a greater sense of pride that is carried into the community and benefit all.

Community Links: We have linked with Hampton College in Peterborough to share initiatives to meet our **sustainable schools' targets**. **Following success with their student 'Green Team', St Ivo will be developing our own eco-ivo steering group** so students are more involved with the decision making process. We welcome support or ideas from parents, carers and businesses.

Ethical Shopping: With fair trade fortnight in the second half of this term from Monday 23rd February to Friday 6th March, we aim to raise awareness of the issues surrounding trade and inequality. In conjunction with the Just Sharing shop in St Ives, the variety of fair trade goods will include small gift items alongside the usual snacks and treats. Fair trade beverages that can be exchanged for a reasonable donation will be delivered to staff rooms at break times this half term. To make it a success we need your support, so bring a little money for some feel-good treats this month.

Energy: To gain green flag eco-schools status, monitoring and reducing our energy consumption is vital. We have **teamed up with local company Green Energy Options (GEO), who install a system that makes energy more 'visible'**. This very exciting technology enriches many curriculum areas. The system analyses the data and displays it in a digital format that can be accessed on the main computer network within the school. We are currently awaiting a decision from 'Curry's Switched on Communities' project to see if the school will receive a financial award for this.

Clothing initiatives: Textile production is very resource intensive and not great for the environment so we should increase the fleeting shelf life of our clothes. Students and staff have been doing a bit of 'swishing' and Mrs Akers lunchtime 'Clothes Swop' is well subscribed. It is hoped that we can have a monthly swap and get us recycling our fashion in style.



Alarmingly every week we gather at least a dustbin bag full of lost items. Not great considering the economic climate. Scouting for Birds



At the end of January we, the Year 13 biologists, donned our clip boards and binoculars in order to participate in the Big School Bird Watch, run by the RSPB. Oozing with enthusiasm, we set out to conquer the school grounds and succeeded in identifying 21 different species of birds, which was a great increase from previous years. We found that the wood pigeon was the most common compared to previous years when it was the crow and the black headed gull. We also saw some more unusual species such as the coal tit, wren and greater spotted woodpecker. Our results will be used by the RSPB in their 30th annual garden Big Garden Bird Watch. The results will be used to compare changes in numbers of each species and the distribution of each species in the country.

We found that the most popular place to spot the birds was the school wildlife and vegetable garden. However we were unnerved by the number of crows staring down at us from the roof tops, it was unclear who was watching who?!...

TIPS FOR USING YOUR CATERING CARD

1. We recommend that you do not keep your catering cards next to keys or any type of electronic device for example mobile phones.
2. The simplest way to top-up your catering account is on-line, you can set up weekly, fortnightly or even monthly recurring payments so you never need worry about running out of funds.
3. Cheques can also be posted in the Purple Boxes located outside the Business Centre or the Dining Hall. Please allow 24hrs for cheques to be credited onto your catering accounts.
4. Your catering card should be kept on your person at all times whilst in school, preferably held in a neck strap inside your clothing.
5. Catering cards should not be left in unattended bags or coats as the school will not be responsible for lost or stolen cards.
6. Report your catering card missing the moment you realise it is not in your possession to safeguard against misuse.
7. **Using another person's card in the vending machine will be deemed as theft and all abuses of the system will be taken extremely seriously.**
8. If you have forgotten your catering card you will be given two opportunities each term to use a PIN number to access funds in your account to purchase a lunch. Once your account has had two PIN numbers assigned in any one term you will have to make alternative arrangements for lunch.
9. Replacement cards can be purchased either from the Business Centre or on Ivo-Online for £5.00, it will be reissued with a neck strap.
