It is good to be writing this as half-term approaches with Spring hopefully not too far away. The highlight of this half-term was undoubtedly our annual Spotlight evenings of Dance with over 200 students participating. The range of styles was impressive as was the general standard of performance and my thanks to Miss Bartley, Miss Franklin and Miss Walmsley and to all the staff who supported this event.

Congratulations to Year 7 who have reached the last 16 of the national football competition and to the sixth form team who successfully reached the last 64 before being knocked out.

Our main staff development focus this year has been to work on Assessment for Learning, ie how we assess pupil progress during a lesson. We were graded a '2' on this by a recent Local Authority inspection but wish to further improve consistency in this area. All teachers are undertaking three peer observations with this focus and pleasing progress is being made.

Budget time is fast approaching and we expect this to be the last year of any increase in our budget before the inevitable squeeze in public sector funding in 2011. We already know that our post-16 funding will be virtually unchanged next year but the pre-16 area should increase by 4%. Final figures will arrive next month and I'll say more about our budget plans in the next Newsletter.

January 25th saw St Ivo playing host to a district Code breaking day. 120 gifted Year 9 mathematicians from all the secondary schools in Huntingdonshire met for a series of collaborative workshops. The highlight of the day was a presentation and workshop from the Cambridge University Enigma Project. This involved a live demonstration of one of the few remaining World War II enigma coding machines.

On February 4th teams from Year 8 and Year 9 competed in the District School Quiz team challenge. The four Year 9 pupils; Ryan, Amelia-Rae, Joe and Joe competed in the senior division against Year 10 pupils from the other schools in the district. They performed brilliantly winning one match and losing one match. This bodes well for next year.



The Year 8 team consisting of Rahath, Liam, Seb and James easily made their way to the final of the competition where they faced Longsands College. In a tense final it all came down to the final question and St Ivo were victorious 270 points to 260.

Congratulations to all concerned.

Later this term the Year 8 team will compete in the first round of the National junior challenge competition.

Sustainability and Energy Saving

We have had great success with our energy saving drive and our Display Energy Certificate (DEC) rating has improved from a low D to a high C rating (54) – this illustrates how efficiently the buildings are being used. We are still aiming to improve and hoping to get a B rating next time.

We had thermal imaging photography done in the worst of a cold day in the winter which clearly illustrated the heat loss through our 50 year old Main Block windows – and elsewhere – and we are starting a rolling programme for replacement of the windows this summer. We also plan to lag the roofs for insulation of the Dance Studio and the Main Block by ICT.

The Premises Governors are considering applying for permission for a wind turbine on site and looking at use of solar panels so we have many and varied plans and ideas.

E-Safety in School

Last term and during this term we have been focusing on the importance of E-safety through assemblies and ICT core lessons. It is very important that students understand the risks with online use, particularly with the increased use of social networking sites such as Facebook. We have had a few incidents of cyber-bullying and inappropriate posts about school on social networking sites. These have been dealt with or reported as soon as we have found out about them. Additionally we have had incidents of students using their phones to take pictures or filming in school and then uploading to public websites. This is against school policy; filming etc on site is prohibited without permission. We have strict child protection policies at school and both the social networking activities and the use of phones for pictures and filming break these and could potentially put children at risk.

At school, in lessons, we emphasise how important it is not to give out personal details online and yet we are now **finding lots of students becoming 'friends' on public sites that then allow personal details to be obtained. Hence this reminder for students and information for parents.** Many thanks to the parents who have recently been alerting us to the inappropriate Facebook pages that have been appearing and helping us remove them.

For the safety of our students and to reduce cyber-bullying we need to all work together to ensure students are aware of the issues and how to protect themselves and others when online. In particular students should be discouraged from:

- Posting their personal details on any public website
- **Becoming online 'friends' with anyone they do not know**
- Posting content about anyone else (including text comments, videos and pictures) without their permission
- Making comments about the school that could offend any member of the school community

The winners received a cash prize and a cookery book.

Although Laura **was not placed, Mrs Abblitt was really impressed with Laura's performance and said that she was in with a strong chance of winning.** Laura cooked chilli prawns as a starter, a main course of lamb cutlets in Guard of Honour served with roasted new potatoes and vegetables, and chocolate fondants as a dessert. Visit by Local Chef to Year 11 Catering Students

On Wednesday, 16th December, ex-St Ivo student Mark Hurley came into three Year 11 catering lessons to demonstrate some of the high level skills he mastered whilst a student of catering at Cambridgeshire Regional College.

Firstly Mark showed the students how to joint a whole chicken. He showed the students how to remove the breast fillets and then oven baked these, sampling later. They were tender and delicious! Mark provided enough chickens for one or two members of each group to practice this skill.

Then he showed the class how to spin sugar in order to make sugar baskets. This will enable the students to gain more marks for practical skills and improve the presentation of their work.

Mark also spoke about career opportunities in the catering industry. He spoke about his experiences as a Chef and then Deputy Manager at The Three Jolly Butchers in Houghton.

Year 7: Medieval models competition

Year 7 showed great effort and enthusiasm in the Medieval castles and weapons competition. The study them this year is about revolutions: English Civil War, American War of Independence, and France 1789. A trip to the Black Country museum is planned for June 2010 as part of their study of the Industrial Revolution. Details will be given to all classes shortly.

Year 9

Students are showing good effort in their preparation of assessment essays on: 'To what extent should the 1920s in America be remembered as good times or bad times?'. Their research covers such topics as the economic boom, Hollywood, Flappers, prohibition and Al Capone, Jazz, Black Americans and the KKK, and the Wall Street Crash. Students are drawing fascinating parallels with the 'Credit Crisis' facing the world today.

Year 10

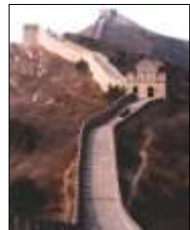

Year 12 Students are looking forward to the trip to Berlin as part of their AS module: Germany 1933-63. This will include an introductory tour of the city centre, Brandenburg Gate, Potsdamer Platz, Goring's Air Ministry, Topography of Terror (former SS and Gestapo HQ), Neue Synagogue, and northern Mitte (a preserved pre-war Jewish area), Sachsenhausen Concentration camp, the stadium built by the Nazis for the 1936 Olympic Games, and Wansee Villa where the 1942 conference decided upon the 'Final Solution' against the Jews.

Year 13 are working hard towards their A2 examinations, including their coursework on Russia.

Community Links

As part of the school's Specialist Status in Humanities, The History Department has built links with the local community in the St. Ives area, in close cooperation with the Civic Society. Developments have included the display of Year 7 model castles in the town and the production of a DVD about St. Ives during WWII (available from the school business centre or the Norris Museum for £7). Also, following a generous donation of local history books, the department has taught lessons on the history of St. Ives and the market. We will shortly be involved in the celebrations marking St. Ives at 900 years old.

Well done to all students who continue to work hard in the department, and help to make it an exciting, fun and high performing place to study history.

They also spent the evening with a survivor from the camp (92 years old) who had been given the job of being camp photographer for the infamous Dr Mengele (famous for carrying out his human experiments). The stories the children heard and the people they met were often inspiring and the children have all returned to England with this acute sense of what it means to be human. We will be holding a Holocaust Memorial Day for all Year 10 pupils in the summer when everybody will get the chance to meet a survivor and share in some of the privileges that those returning from Auschwitz this week will have had.

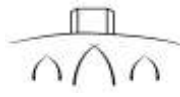
