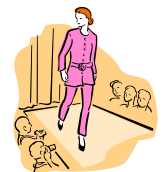
Year 12 students should arrive at 8.30am - Induction days: Friday, 3rd September and Monday, 6th September.

Geography Department News

On Monday 7th June Year 7 students launched their Japan week in style with the help of London-based Taiko Mean-time. Twenty eight students enjoyed a full-day workshop with the Japanese drummers and in the afternoon put on a performance for their fellow students in the Burgess Hall. The students had a great experience and the level of performance at the end belied the fact that they had no previous experience of this type of drumming.

Japan Week, an initiative set up and co-ordinated by the school's geography department, also included a day with Sonia Leong, a well known manga artist. She conducted workshops with Year 7 students, showing them how to draw manga comics and how to succeed in the industry. She also judged a school-wide manga competition which was won by Year 10 student Katie. Year 7 students have also been learning about different aspects of Japanese life, history, culture and diversity throughout many of their lessons.

Year 7 have also had the opportunity this term to visit the **Coldham's Farm** wind turbine and experience a day run by the Cambridgeshire Environmental Education Centre which complements the work carried out by students and ties in with our aim to become an eco school.

Year 8 have been to Stibbington to experience the delights of getting in a river and doing some 'hands on' geography. They learnt not only about the physical geography of rivers but also the problems of flooding.

Year 9 have been to Aldeburgh and Dunwich along the Suffolk coast to study coastal defence issues and the management of two contrasting areas. The visit also included a talk by the museum staff in Dunwich.



Year 10 have been out and about over the last few weeks. After their module exam they have been collecting data on the environmental quality of different areas in St Ives as part of their coursework module for GCSE.

A large group of Year 10 GCSE students are also lucky enough to be visiting Iceland during the summer term. They will be staying near to the infamous Eyjafjallajokull volcano which caused so much disruption in April, as well as swimming in the Blue Lagoon thermal pool, visiting waterfalls, glaciers, hot springs and geysers. This is an annual trip which is open to all Year 10 GCSE students.

Year 12 AS/ A2 geographers have been along the North Norfolk coast to Holkham Bay where they collected data to support their A2 fieldwork on sand dunes.



Advanced notice – in October the geography department run a visit to South Africa. Those students who are going will be invited to an information evening on September 30th.

Year 7

Students have been busy taking their summer exam, and studying the Renaissance and Reformation. Can you remember what happened to the six wives of King Henry VIII? Divorced, beheaded...???



Year 8

Students greatly enjoyed the trip to the Black Country museum in June as part of their study of the Industrial Revolution. Furthermore many students have signed up for the Somme battlefields trip on Friday November 5th 2010 as part of the Year 9 course on World War I.

Year 9

Students have been writing their controlled assessment exam on: to what extent did Hitler and the Nazis fully control the German people 1933-45.



They are now studying turning points during World War II 1939-45, including the Dunkirk evacuation, the Battle of Britain, the Blitz, Hitler's invasion of Russia, Pearl Harbour, the D-Day landings, the defeat of Germany, and the dropping of atomic bombs on Japan.



Year 10

Students should be congratulated for working very hard on their GCSE controlled assessment. Their essay focused on: What was the extent of change in employment opportunities for women 1955-1975? They will soon focus on the debate: **How accurate is the term 'swinging sixties'?** Many interesting views are expected!

Year 12

All students worked very hard towards their two summer module exams on: Germany 1933-63, and Pitt to Peel 1783-1846. They are now studying introductions to their A2 modules on: Ireland 1798-1921, and Russia 1894-1924. Many have also opted to go on the popular trip to Dublin in November 2010 as part of their Irish studies.

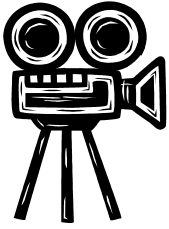

MFL Department News

One of the greatest language experts and gurus of the 20th century, Eric Hawkins, often talked of how the rehearsal of languages in the classroom was a preparation for the performance in the real world. 2009-10 has been an academic year full of activities in which we have tried to provide young people with chances to perform in “real” situations. **Year 13 pupils went to Germany to do work experience whilst some Year 11 students of languages practised their languages in mock towns and others joined our well established Saturday events.** Year 9 pupils joined students from across the county in work related activities in modern languages. Year 8 pupils went to France to see what bread making, crêpe making and a Christmas market were like and Year 8 and 9 students of German explored various aspects of two German cities. There was no doubt in the feedback that the chocolate museum in Cologne was very popular indeed. And last but not least, the Year 8 Latin group performed a short play at the Roman theatre in St Albans.

We also strive in the department to give pupils a taste of languages we are not normally able to offer in the curriculum. **In our celebration of the European Day of Languages, our “Talk the talk” event and the related tasks in culture classes,** as well as in our after school Italian and Latin classes, we have worked with pupils in sessions where they have explored a wide range of other languages sometimes as after school in greater depth and sometimes as in taster lessons in less depth.



Preparations for the coming year are well underway. 52 youngsters from Year 8 will be spending 3 days at the end of the Autumn Term living in a French chateau, using their French in a variety of tasks in French towns and discovering how bread is made. 40 youngsters from Years 8 and 9 will be staying in a castle in Germany in July 2011. On this trip we are planning a visit to a German school and challenging activities in 2 local towns. We still have 5 places free on this trip so all main or second language students who are interested should see Mrs Zähler for a letter or leave her a message asking for details. The Year 10 able, gifted and talented group in Latin will be visiting St Albans and working with local experts. For Year 9 main language French and German we have booked the return of the theatre company whose performances were so popular 2 years ago. Look out, too, in Year 9 for exciting work related events for Year 9 in French and German and the application letter for the Italian course after school on Thursdays from October on. We are planning exchanges in German in Years 10 and 13, Saturday events for Year 11 pupils in French and German and a conference for GCSE pupils in French.

If you think you have missed information about the trips or want more details please do contact me. You will find me in room 2 from September on.

At the end of this year, we are saying thank you to Miss Trouset who has worked hard during Mrs Moore’s maternity leave to ensure that her classes were given the best teaching and wish her all the best for the future. We say thank you to Mrs Roberts for all her hard work for pupils during the past 7 years of teaching in the department and wish her all the best for the future as she relocates. We also wish Mrs Taylor a happy retirement and thank her for over 20 years of work in the departments of English and Modern Languages and her support on so many trips abroad. We will remember you all with affection and miss you all.

Visits from outside speakers

Sonia Leong - On 10th June we were fortunate enough to have a manga artist, Sonia Leong, come to our school. She held several sessions for Year 7s in the RC, showing them how to draw manga and getting them to have a go. The children enjoyed her visit.

Manga Competition - We held a competition in the RC prior to her visit, getting the children to draw a manga version of themselves from a photograph which they submitted with the drawing. The winner was Katie (10Cf/Md) who won a framed Sonia Leong creation. The runners up were Shannon (7We), Leah (9An) and Amy (11Bt) who were highly commended for their manga self-portraits.

Sam Enthoven – On 1st July we had a fantastic day with Sam Enthoven, children’s author. He spoke to all of Year 7 about his experiences as an author, and answered lots of the children’s questions. He also signed copies of his books (‘Tim, Defender of the Earth’, ‘The Black Tattoo’ and ‘Crawlers’) and read sections from them.

Story Writing Competition - We held a story writing competition where the children were given the first paragraph of ‘The Black Tattoo’ and they had to continue with their version of the story. The winner was Ellie (7Bz) winning a book voucher and chocolates with runner up Ned (7We) winning chocolates. These stories and all the other nominations are on display in the RC – come and have a look!

Model Competition - We also held a model making competition where the children could make models of demons featured in the same book. Many thanks to the Art Department for facilitating this on several lunchtimes. The winner of the model competition was Isobel (7Sn) winning book vouchers and chocolates, with runner up Anna (7Sn) winning chocolates. Governors' News

This annual column is one way in which we hope to keep parents and carers informed of the work of the School's Governors.

Governors are not responsible for the management of the School: that is the job of the Head and his management team. The Governing Body is responsible for –

- determining the strategic direction of the School
- ensuring that the School fulfils its legal responsibilities, and
- **holding the school's management to account, as a "critical friend"**.

We are greatly helped in our role by regular presentations from teachers and other support staff with special responsibilities within the School, which are, without exception, very professional and informative. In the past year we have had such presentations on the 2009 exam results, target setting for the 2011 public exams, the **development of the School's highly-praised virtual learning environment**, child protection and the work of the inclusion team.

This past year we have also been privileged to have excellent and enthusiastic presentations from three groups of students –

- the Eco-School Initiative group, whose work on energy saving is most impressive and important
- a group who described movingly their visit to Auschwitz, and
- **the "Junior Challenge" quiz team from the Gifted and Talented Group, who had set a quiz for us!**

All the students involved are to be congratulated on the clarity of their presentations – and for their courage in speaking to full meetings of the Governors!

The following paragraphs describe some of the work of our Committees over the past year:

Curriculum: The main task of the Curriculum Committee is to analyse the extent to which the School provides learning opportunities which properly cater for the interests, aptitudes and needs of our students, and whether the teaching and organisation of the curriculum –

- motivates students to learn
- is inclusive by ensuring equality of access and opportunity for all students, and
- prepares students effectively for subsequent stages of education or life.

Much of the Committee's work is to scrutinise the provision and to analyse data concerning learning outcomes, including external examinations such as GCSE, AS and A levels. This year's GCSE results, when compared to similar students in other schools, were a little disappointing. However there were some atypical contributory factors including an unusually high student turnover. A similar comparison based on A level results places St Ivo in the top 10% of schools nationally.

At present the range of courses available at St Ivo in Key Stage 4 has a stronger emphasis on academic subjects than many schools in the area. This may in part explain the apparent contradiction in the achievement of GCSE and A level students.

The Curriculum Committee also reviews and updates school policies which fall within its remit. This year the **Committee has helped the School to formulate a Collective Worship policy, which outlines and explains the School's approach to this area of provision.**

The Committee also often receives presentations from Heads of Department and members of the Senior Management Team. This year the Head of Science was able to report on various improvements made in the Science Department including:

- a significant improvement in GCSE results (65% pass rate, 4.8% above target)
- teaching which strives to promote enjoyment, challenge and support, and
- entitlement which sees Y9-Y11 moving towards a triple science provision (Physics, Chemistry and Biology) where appropriate.

The Committee also examines homework policy. The effectiveness of homework is regarded as a key issue at St Ivo and the following means of improvement have been identified –

- homework requirements should be clearly written down
- teachers should ensure homework requirements are fully understood
- the effectiveness of homework should be regularly reviewed, and
- marking should be swift to provide a more effective feedback to the students.

The Governors on the Curriculum Committee were disappointed that St Ivo was not part of the Healthy Schools Initiative.

Personnel: Work continued throughout the year on the issue of attendance with the Committee receiving a **regular detailed report on progress made. It is pleasing to report that the School's Student Attendance record shows major improvement since the start of this exercise and we are now regarded as a high achiever in this area.**

The Committee continued to work through the various statutory and optional policies, and very few still require attention other than the normal periodic review. As part of this exercise, the Committee decided to allocate a limited number of outputs and outcomes to appropriate policies. When these policies are due for their review, the Committee will consider, as part of the review process, a brief report on these measures in order to establish if the policy is working as intended.

In addition to the normal staffing and recruitment issues arising throughout the year, work has commenced on monitoring the performance management scheme for support staff to establish if it is working satisfactorily.

Finance: Even before the recent General Election, the Finance Committee had begun preparations for this autumn's **Comprehensive Spending Review, and the obvious reductions in public spending which will result. Although the Coalition Government has said it wishes to protect "front line" services, teachers require access to important support services and technology effectively to deliver today's curriculum, and we do not believe that schools will escape funding cuts.**

In this county, we fear that the effect of spending reductions will be exacerbated by the fact that Cambridgeshire schools have historically received less Government money per student than schools in neighbouring counties. As an added pressure on school budgets, the next few years are predicted to bring a cyclical reduction in student numbers - and most of our funding is based on the number of students on our roll.

In response, the Committee is conducting a **line-by-line review of the School's budget, to identify areas where savings may be made if necessary, whilst minimising the impact on the quality of teaching and learning or on the School environment.** Anticipating that cuts which the County Council has to make may affect the level of central support services provided to schools, we are also exploring with our partner schools how closer working together might provide opportunities to provide substitute services cost effectively.

We will also, as a Governing Body, consider the implications and potential advantages of any Government initiatives – like the expansion of the Academies Programme – which might benefit the School, but further information on such initiatives will only emerge from Whitehall over the coming months.

Premises: It has been another busy year for the Premises Team at St Ivo School. The usual problems with maintaining school buildings over 50 years old are a continuing issue – rather like painting the Forth Bridge! A great deal of work was carried out over the summer break in 2009 to improve the teaching and learning environment for both staff and students. Further work is planned over the coming summer holidays. We would like to thank the premises team for all of the work that they have put in and continue to do throughout the year.

We are aware of the proposed housing development at St Ives Golf Course and we are working with the developers to ensure that the works do not impinge on the activities of the School – and, more importantly, do not create a danger to students and staff.

We are continuing our work on energy saving throughout the School, in order to reduce our contribution to carbon emissions and to save money. We are currently assessing the possibility of installing solar panels to reduce our carbon footprint.

Our dining hall continues to be a success. We are now looking at opportunities within the School grounds to grow some of our own food that can then be prepared, cooked and then served in the dining hall.

Community: Our Community Committee considers not only adult education programmes, but the many ways in which the School integrates with the local community. Through our specialist school status and the “extended schools” programme, the close liaison with other schools continues, as does our work with other agencies, to ensure that our students and their families receive the support and advice they need.

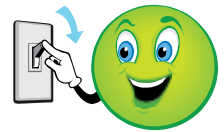
Although these are challenging times for all funding, the adult community learning team has continued to work hard to provide a varied range of courses for you to enjoy. The team is constantly adapting courses to meet your needs, and is always ready to accept your suggestions for both educational and leisure courses – so let them know if a course you would like to take is not currently in the prospectus. The St Ives Prospectus will be out in the summer, with many new courses for you to enjoy.

What an exciting start to the term we have had! A beautiful glass plaque sits in the school cabinet and on it is inscribed 'Best Environmental Secondary School'. Yes, we submitted our application to the Huntingdonshire Green Heart Community Awards and won! The prize is a true testimony to the work the students have completed this year towards caring for their environment both locally and on a global scale.



Talking of global, all eyes have been on South Africa with the football matches and the Geography Department has had a large wall display of World Cup Geography dominating the far wall. Taking this opportunity to raise awareness of the great work that Fairtrade is doing in South Africa, the Eco-Ivo Student Committee held a 'Fairplay for Africa' day with stalls giving away South African apple juice and cookies made with South African grown raisins. Two competitions were held for students and staff who had to predict the scores of the England-Slovenia and the England-Germany matches. Dominic, Year 7 and Mrs Slater won Fairtrade footballs.

The Energy Club, with its aim of reducing energy consumption, have introduced a league table for the lower school to start in September. "Snipers" have uncovered teachers who do not switch off unused appliances and raised awareness amongst the staff of the need to do so. Well done them!



To reward the hard work of the Eco-Ivo Student Committee (meets on a Friday in N17) and the Energy Club (meets on a Wednesday in N13) a trip was organised to the Eco-Schools Show at the East of England Showground. Students across the years were able to talk to eco-friendly companies and councils, to participate in experiments, to give their views and opinions and to realise the importance of a strong commitment to a green future.

If anyone would like to join either of these clubs, do come and see Mrs Morey in N17 at the start of the new term.
