# Governors' News

Personnel: The Committee were delighted to note that the work previously undertaken by senior staff and monitored by the Personnel Committee on Attendance within the school had been reflected in the recently received Ofsted Report. The Committee will continue to receive update reports on this topic.

Work continued throughout the year on reviewing all the Personnel Policy documents and it is pleasing to note that all have now been updated and will be subject to review on either a one, two or three year cycle, dependent upon the subject matter of each policy document.

In April 2010 the Committee received and considered a School Survey Report produced by the National Schools Health Education Unit. This document contains significant amounts of detail regarding the *health related behaviour of young people in St Ivo School*. This report is produced every two years and will be of value to the Committee when setting Targets and Outcomes for relevant policies.

In addition, the Committee continued to monitor and review different aspects of staffing within the school.

## ICT Mark

Early in July the school was awarded the ICT Mark for another three years. We are hoping to launch the new VLE (Virtual Learning Environment) and the revised and enhanced parent portal (IvoOnline) in September. Log in details will be the same, so you should have no problem in accessing IvoOnline in September, but you will notice a big difference in layout and functionality. 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## Learning 4 Life @ St Ivo

Monday 11th July was the St Ivo Learning 4 Life Day. 300 Year 9 students participated in 6 workshops on different topics and led by 22 guest speakers from all over the UK.

Cornerstone Pregnancy Crisis Care led lively interactive sessions on the importance of loving positive relationships; the Cambridge based charity sexYOUality led sessions on sexual identity and the importance of using non-judgemental language; Drinksense delivered hard hitting and informative sessions on alcohol abuse and making safe choices; a team from CASUS gave our students invaluable information about drugs and their short and long term effects on the body and mind; the local NHS School Nurse Team **provided information on contraception and STI's; and Quit Because...** led an exciting and thoroughly engaging workshop on the facts about smoking.

**The aim of the day was to support the PSHE department and indeed the school's commitment to keep our young people HAPPY AND SAFE and early feedback suggests that the day was enjoyable, challenging and informative. Our young people were not "preached at" but rather given the facts and evidence needed to make informed decisions about their own wellbeing.**

I would like to thank all the students who interacted and participated extraordinarily well, as well as our very gifted contributors from both outside and within the school, for making it such a worthwhile day.

# RE Department News

## St Ivo School Holocaust Day and trip to Auschwitz

The Year 10 students had the life changing opportunity to meet a survivor of the Holocaust. Mr Harry Fox (born Chaim Fuks in Poland) came to the school to tell the children of his experiences when he was their age during the Holocaust as a Jew. Only he and his brother survived from the immediate family and the children were moved as he described his experiences to them. You could hear a pin drop in the hall as three hundred children listened to this remarkable eighty one year old man.

The visit by Harry was part of the annual Holocaust Memorial Day that the school runs to remember the millions of victims of genocide globally and throughout history. We look at the stories of other victims in places like Rwanda, Kenya and the former Yugoslavia in the hope that by being able to identify the steps of genocide, which begin with a racist comment in the playground or a biased headline in a newspaper, the children will ensure these atrocities do not continue. The children also benefited on the day from the work that Jonathan Salt, a local director and expert on Holocaust education did with them as a part of the programme.

The day itself compliments the opportunity that all students get in the school to visit Auschwitz every February which they have done for the past five years and has been a life changing experience for many of them. The next trip to Auschwitz will be running in February 2012, and a letter will be going out to all students in years 10-13. You can also request one directly from Mrs Kenton-Howells should the letter not make it home in the bag.

## Twining with Pakistan and trip to Istanbul

We are very lucky to be twinned, through the British Council, with a school in Rawalpindi Pakistan. It is a private school for children aged between 11 and 18. Already we have shared lessons in RE with each other using Skype where we had live link up with the two classrooms on each side of the world. The children shared interests and hobbies, songs and even made traditional food from each country to show each other. It showed the wonders of technology that two groups of children on different sides of the world could share the same lesson and teachers at the same time. The children and staff involved loved the opportunity to meet our neighbours. There are many activities planned with the two schools to enable the children to learn about each other, gain an understanding of what it means to be a global citizen, and dispel misconceptions. As from September this will become a whole school initiative and all children will have the opportunity to take part in these innovative and exciting activities.

The idea of cultural exchange will be enhanced also by the trip to Istanbul which is planned for Easter 2012. This will be open to students in Year 10 – thirteen who have opted to take Ethics, Philosophy and Theology at GCSE and A level. Again please ask if the letter does not make it home.

## Rome Revision weekend

Just before the Easter break the GCSE and A level students of Ethics, Philosophy and Theology enjoyed a weekend in Rome which gave them the wonderful and unique opportunity to revise for their exams in this beautiful city. They got to see the places of historical and religious significance to the course, and they spent the afternoon at the English College in Rome talking about ethical and religious matters with trainee priests. They were lucky enough to spend the **weekend at the amazing villa which belongs to the college and overlooks Rome and the Pope's holiday residence and lake.** I am confident it will ensure their exam success this summer and wish them all the best.

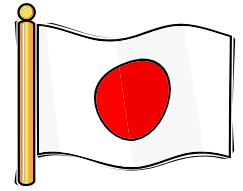

# Geography Department News

This has been an exceptionally busy half term in the geography department. As the weather has warmed up so we have tried to get out and about as much as possible.

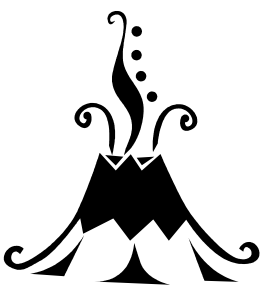
Year 7 have recently been down to the Eco House on St Audrey Lane in St Ives and have found much of what is on show really interesting and well worth the visit.

Earlier in the term they also did an in depth study of the social and cultural geography of Japan . This involved all Year 7 watching a demonstration by a Taiko drummer and then thirty plus students had a 3 hour practical session culminating in a final concert of Taiko drumming in front of all Year 7 and any parents who could get along to see them. Other sessions included learning about the geography of Japan, aspects of their language as well as typical Japanese food and much more.



Year 8 went on a day trip to Stibbington in which students had the chance to study rivers - this is a very practical day in which many students get wet but enjoy their time, while learning much about river processes and the land use around them.

Year 9 students had the opportunity to go to Dunwich and Aldeburgh in June where they were considering the case for sea defences - Is Dunwich Doomed ? as opposed to Action in Aldeburgh. An added bonus this year was the presence of the Time Team television crew, including Tony Robinson, in excavating the car park at Dunwich.



Year 10 students have also been out and about and have spent time since their module exam collecting environmental data in St Ives. This is in preparation for their coursework which they will be writing up next year. Many of the Year 10 students are off to Iceland for the last week of the summer term. Here they will be looking at volcanoes - hopefully that are not too active - glaciers, waterfalls, going whale watching as well as swimming in geothermal pools such as the Blue Lagoon.

This is an annual geography GCSE field trip and letters will be going out in September regarding the 2012 visit to students who are starting the GCSE geography course.

Year 12 geographers had a very successful residential field trip to Snowdonia earlier in the term but now that they have completed their AS level they have started work on an A2 ecosystems module. This has involved a trip to Holkham Bay in North Norfolk where they did a sand dune study.

## Travel and Tourism Department

Travel and Tourism students have recently been to Cambridge where they are doing a research module assessing how much of an issue the current economic down turn has been for the travel and tourism industry in the city. This involved a talk given by the tourist information office manager, a guided tour of Kings College chapel as well as questionnaire work and additional research of other attractions.

In September new AS travel and tourism students will be offered the chance to visit New York in February 2012 as part of their course. Letters will be available in September giving details.

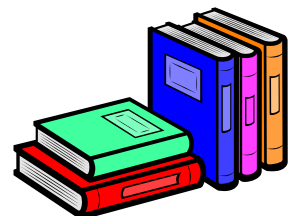
