2012/2013 AUTUMN TERM

The first day back for students is Wednesday, 5th September.

Governors' News

Curriculum Committee

The Curriculum Committee meets to discuss the programme of courses offered by the school, and to help provide strategic advice to the Headteacher and his team. To facilitate this we meet with school staff, and ask a Head of Department to attend each committee meeting to receive a report on how a subject area is progressing. For example, recently Mr Cook, the Gifted and Talented Coordinator, presented how the school manages the programme to support pupils who have demonstrated a particular aptitude in a subject.

Our group also review school policies that relate to the delivery of the curriculum. As part of a continuous process improvement effort the Committee has recently taken responsibility for a number of policies that had been monitored by the Personnel Committee. This year we reviewed the ICT policy developed by Mr Davies, and the Marking, Assessment, Recording and Reporting policy developed by Dr Carr.

Perhaps more importantly the school is undertaking a comprehensive Curriculum Review and we will contribute to that. Already there have been changes in the Sixth form courses, the courses used to promote Vocational Learning, and we have been active in the discussions on how the school should promote the English Baccalaureate.

I would like to thank the Committee members for their work during the year. Please feel free to approach me if you have any questions about our work.

Personnel Committee

The Personnel Committee has met on 5 occasions during the 2011/12 academic year and has discussed a variety of personnel topics at these meetings.

The main Governing Body agreed to a proposed change to the Terms of Reference for the committee which resulted in **all "Pupil" related matters being transferred to the newly titled Student Welfare and Community Committee. This now leaves the Personnel Committee free to concentrate on all Employee related topics.**

A major part of the year's work for the committee involved the checking, amending and implementing of all the required employee related policies. These documents contain statutory elements and this is a vital part of the committee's normal work. In addition, regular updates were received regarding the movement of staff within the school, including all leavers and new starters.

The school also agreed to enter into a new Staff Welfare Scheme for all employees. This gives them the opportunity, at no cost, to talk in confidence to independent professionals and receive advice on financial, medical or legal matters together with a range of other support topics. The first report received by the committee indicates that this has proved to be a popular and very useful service. Regular updates will be received during the coming year based on a detailed survey.

At Committee and Full Governors meetings during the year we have been pleased to receive reports on how the pupils and the School have been involved in an increasing number of local projects.

Both the Inclusion Department and the Locality Team continue to liaise with other agencies, and work extremely hard to ensure that our pupils, and their families, receive the support and advice they need; we are very happy to support their work.

Student welfare issues are monitored regularly via the [Balding Survey \(www.sheu.org.uk\)](http://www.sheu.org.uk) and we look forward to **receiving the results of this year's survey in the autumn term.**

The [Community Education Team](#) are responsible for providing learning opportunities for adults, and the community in general, to access part-time evening, daytime and weekend courses that are considered of interest. The team strives to produce a varied range of educational, technical, physical and hobby based courses for you to enjoy. The provision of this facility is subsidised and funding remains a constant challenge; the management team continually analyse the type and scope of courses to ensure that they are cost effective and meet an appropriate quality standard. Eligible parents/carers should apply early, as funds are limited, either by visiting the webpage below or contacting the Council on 01480 372307/8 for a paper application form.

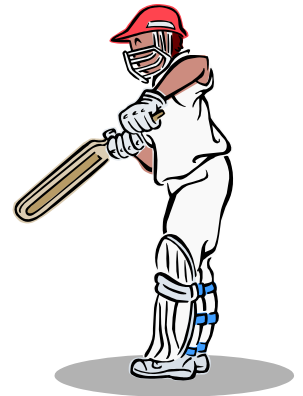

Skype lessons - Year 9 with US author

We have been able to make full use of technology in the RE department again this term.

Year 9 students have been studying the genocide in Rwanda and looked at people who

risked their lives to help others. One man, Carl Wilkens, author of "I'm Not Leaving" was the only American to stay in Rwanda during the genocide and he kindly agreed to have a video conference with us to answer all of the questions the students had as a result of their studies. Being in Washington in the west of the US he happily got up at 6am to be able to share his experiences and lessons with our classes. His story is a powerful and inspiring one, and the students and staff got a great deal from the opportunity of being able to talk with him, thanks to the wonders of technology.



Year 10 video conference with school in Islamabad on poverty

The GCSE class were able to make the most of our contacts with a school in Pakistan and carry out research and presentations together with the children there. They focussed on poverty, and looked at what it means to be poor in the UK and Pakistan, and the work of different charities in alleviating this suffering. Video conferencing allowed the students to share their findings with each other between the two countries. This was a wonderful opportunity which complimented their work for their GCSE studies, and again both staff and students enjoyed the experience.

Year 10 Holocaust Memorial Day

On June 29th our Year 10 commemorated our annual Holocaust Memorial Day. During the day we focus on genocides around the world and consider our place and responsibility in the world. We were blessed again with a visit from Harry Fox. Harry was fourteen when he went through the Holocaust in Poland and sadly lost his all of his family, apart from his brother. His story is an emotional and moving personal account which always inspires the children and provokes a great deal of thought and discussion. All Year 10 students took part in the day which they shared with their tutors, and they were able to watch a video message recorded especially for the day by Carl Wilkens on his

experiences in the Rwandan genocide. Twenty of the students also had the chance to spend the day with Jonathan Salt a local director of youth theatre and specialist in genocide education. They put on a production at the end of the day asking us to think about what choices we would make if we found ourselves having to choose between good and evil. The day was finished off with a visit from a Rabbi in Cambridge who led the closing prayer for the dead as the children lit memorial candles. A very thought provoking day. The students were exceptional in their response to our visitors, and we say a huge thank you to all of our visiting speakers who made the day so special and memorable.

Trip to Auschwitz - Poland

The annual trip to Auschwitz will be run in July 2013 and will be open to all students from Year 10-13. Please look out for the letter launching the trip in September. The approximate cost for the four days will be around £625 and that is an all inclusive price which includes airfare to Poland and all transfers.

Students have been busy taking their summer exam, and studying the Renaissance and Reformation. Can you remember what happened to the six wives of King Henry VIII? Divorced, beheaded...???



Year 8

Students greatly enjoyed the trip to the Black Country museum in June as part of their study of the Industrial Revolution. Furthermore many students have signed up for the Somme battlefields trip in November 2012 as part of the Year 9 course on World War I.

Year 9

Students have been writing their controlled assessment exam on: to what extent did Hitler and the Nazis fully control the German people 1933-45.

They are now studying turning points during World War II 1939-45, including the Dunkirk evacuation, the Battle of Britain, the Blitz, Hitler's invasion of Russia, Pearl Harbour, the D-Day landings, the defeat of Germany, and the dropping of atomic bombs on Japan.



Year 10

Students have completed their study of the USA 1945-70, including black civil rights, the women's movement and the student movement such as 'hippies' and the Vietnam War. During the summer, students will receive their controlled assessment exam results about race riots in Notting Hill 1958.

They are now studying introductions to their A2 modules on: Ireland 1798-1921, and Russia 1894-1924. Forthcoming Events

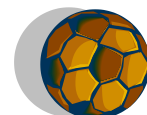

So much has happened with Eco-Ivo this year that I am going to cut activities down to a brief comment each and end with looking forward excitedly to next year. This is what the Eco-Ivo group and many students in school have been doing throughout this academic year.



Fairtrade: In the new year we put in a bid for Fairtrade status as a result of all the good work we have done at St Ivo over the years. We were told by the Fairtrade Foundation in London that it took about 6-8 weeks to be told the result; the school was told in 2! The bid was so strong and the work that we had completed so wonderful that we got our status almost immediately, which is apparently quite rare. In December we held our Fairtrade Quiz for the primary school children of St.Ives at the Christmas market and were helped out by the local MP, Mr Jonathon Djanogly. The quiz had been preceded by Fairtrade talks given by sixth form students to children at the primary schools of the town. In Fairtrade Fortnight at the end of February students and staff supported the sale of Fairtrade products and a Fairtrade speaker attended all assemblies to raise awareness of the work being done by Fairtrade. St.Ivo School continues to support the St.Ives Fairtrade committee. As you can see the Fairtrade message is at the heart of a lot of the work we do at St Ivo.

Friends of Holt Island Nature Reserve (FOHINR): It is important that we support environmental projects, not only abroad, but also at home, and our ongoing relationship with the FOHINR has gone from strength to strength this year. We have had speakers in to tell the Eco-Ivo group about the work that has been done and students have visited the site, which is only 2 minutes away.....it is truly on our doorstep! Eco-Ivo has sponsored bird boxes on the island and students have visited these to see nesting birds and later the fledglings. We look forward to more activities with this excellent local environmental group.

Tree Planting in The Thicket: In March the Eco-Ivo group were delighted to be asked by HDC to help plant saplings in The Thicket next to the school. Students found they were quite nifty with a spade and a number of young trees were put in the ground. Many thanks go to Miss Bell (geography teacher) who accompanied the students.

Eco-gardening in St Ivo School: Pam Coles has worked quietly, but unceasingly to create an environmental gardening area on the limited school site and credit must go to her for that. We now have 5 ponds that are used for classroom activities and a variety of vegetables are grown, some of which are sold on site. The leeks are delicious. In addition, bedding plants are for sale each spring brightening up the gardens of staff and students alike. Thank you to the Gardening Club! Lately, Mrs Coles has been encouraging the planting of species that attract bees and butterflies upgrading the environmental condition of that area of the school grounds. 14 kinds of butterfly have been recorded for the last two summers.



Save the Albatross: We have collected stamps in school for many years for this worthy cause, but this year, it was brought to our attention that the albatross parent birds are feeding their chicks rubbish from the litter island/continent that, unfortunately, drifts in the south Pacific. This practice on the part of the birds is decimating the albatross chick population and so the students wanted to raise awareness that this was taking place so we could all be sure to bring in stamps which will then be taken to the RSPB headquarters in Sandy, Bedfordshire by Mr. Gray (geography teacher) to be converted in to cash to send out to Midway and other Pacific islands where the birds nest. A competition to design stamp boxes was held in school and won by Year 7 and Year 9 students. Our thanks go to Mr Burry in Design & Technology for all his help.
