Drama & Music Department News

Les Miserables

It was such a privilege to witness the opening night of Les Miserables at the Burgess Hall. As the director of several school productions, it is always so gratifying to see everything come together in front of a live audience. Tuesday was extra special though.

Firstly, this is the first production we have ever done which is entirely sung-through, meaning that there is no spoken dialogue between characters. Performers sing throughout the entire show, and of course the orchestra never stop playing. This presents challenges for even a professional cast, but especially a cast of young people from 11-19. The show never stops, and actors have no "down time" to take stock and rectify any errors made in a live performance. In addition to this, the music is notoriously difficult, with many extremely tricky musical cues, unexpected intervals and time signatures, which of course give the show its emotional impact, but which can prove too much for amateur performers.



On Tuesday, our talented cast and crew of over 100 young people worked together as one, to ensure the show ran slickly and professionally. Their truthful and passionate performances moved many audience members to tears, and belied the challenges faced by the cast in the gruelling run up to the show. Several cast members had experienced illness, exacerbated by tiredness and vocal strain. One in particular, who played a lead role, lost his voice two days before opening night and was unable to perform, resulting in two other cast members taking on new understudy roles approximately four hours before the show began. Had it not been for the information provided in the programmes, no one would have known! The cast pulled together, supporting one another and ensuring that the show went ahead. Thanks to his understudies, who allowed him to rest his voice for 48 hours, our leading cast member was able to return to his original role the following night. Wonderful!

It is a great social opportunity to meet other people in year 7 and 8 with similar interests as well as extending and deepening geographical knowledge and understanding. The Geography club have just started a new topic on the geography of disease. Students have already mapped a Cholera outbreak in the 1950s and are now researching a disease outbreak of their choice from the Spanish influenza during

the war to the recent Ebola outbreak. Students will then be watching the film contagion to identify the fact from the fiction and consider whether infectious diseases are a real threat in the modern world.

Tassomai Revision Resource

The Science department is delighted be introducing a new GCSE revision resource called 'Tassomai'. It is a multiple choice question based programme that organises and adapts to the individual learner and guides them through their revision. It works on the idea of little and often, helping students revise every day for just a short amount of time instead of less effective, longer sessions with large gaps in between. Having secured a vastly discounted rate, for a one off payment of only £15, students can have access until their exam day. We are optimistic it can have a significantly positive impact on the students who use it to its full potential. It is currently only available to Year 11 (as the demand has been so high we want to be able to process orders efficiently) but it should be introduced to Year 10 soon after half term. 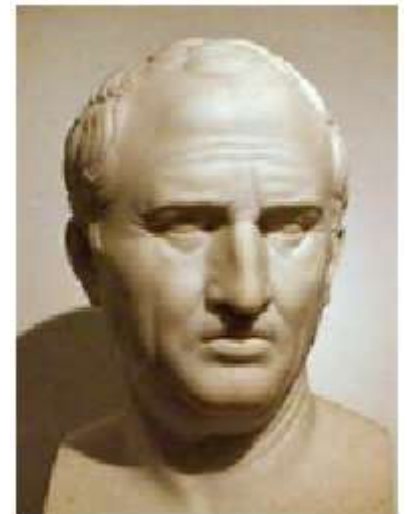
Classics News

Following the successful launch of Classical Civilisation at A Level, it is now a subject that is also available at St Ivo as a GCSE. Year 9 students are currently in the throes of figuring out their options for next year, so it is a timely and welcome introduction to the curriculum.

The course itself is new as of September 2017, following the recent changes to GCSEs across the board. It is a linear course, covering two years, that culminates in two final exams, graded 9-1.

An exciting time for the classics, then! The study of ancient Greece and Rome is becoming ever more popular in the light of recent political headlines in the media, as we look back to the establishment of political powers and democracies, within the mind set of Western culture.

Only last week we were hit with the news that *1984* has topped the best seller charts following an 'alternative facts' comment by Donald Trump's campaign manager, Kellyanne Conway. And with US politics being a headline grabber, people are becoming increasingly interested in the models on which it is based: the Democratic party taking its name from the 5th Century BC political movement in Athens (*Demos* meaning 'the people'); the Republicans reaching back over the millennia to the Republic of Rome (*Res Publica* meaning literally 'public things'); Even the Senate (in Rome the council of elders taken from the Latin *Senex* meaning old man) attempts to model itself on that famous, Roman, political establishment.

Of course, the new GCSE is studied in translation and no prior knowledge is needed, but it is a wide ranging course, not just looking at the genesis of our own political establishments, but also ancient art, ancient temple floor plans, and (my particular favourite) ancient literature.

So, whether it's a question of how and when our culture took its first steps towards the modern body politic, or just why Hermes' son is such a tricky character in *Percy Jackson and the Lightning Thief*, St Ivo School will soon be able to furnish those students who are curious with the answers.

A trip to the UK University & Apprenticeship Search event at the Emirates Stadium in London has been organised for Friday, 3 March. A number of events will also take place later in the summer term to include: guest speakers in assemblies, trips to the UCAS Convention at Anglia Ruskin University and Nottingham University Open Day, and a Higher Education information evening for parents/carers in June. Details of all events will be confirmed later in the summer term.

Students from both Years 12 and 13 who are looking to enter the world of work will continue to be supported with apprenticeship applications, CV writing and interview techniques. All Sixth Form students have the opportunity to meet with Mr Witham, the careers adviser, and should ask to be referred for an appointment through form tutors.

At the time of writing, Sixth Form students are rehearsing for the whole school production of **“Les Miserables”** with many more supporting behind the scenes. We are looking forward to what promises to be a fantastic show and wish everyone involved **‘Good Luck’**.



We are very fortunate to have an Art Masters student from Goldsmiths College in London visiting Sixth Form students of Art, Photography, Textiles and Graphics on 10 February. Emily Perry has exhibited her work in Berlin, London, Brighton and Cawdor Castle in Scotland. She is now studying for a Masters in Sculpture at Goldsmiths College and will be talking to students about her experiences as an artist, as well as offering advice on preparing for the A level exams and applying to university and art foundation courses.
