# Ethics and Philosophy Department News



We have had a busy couple of terms in the Ethics and Philosophy Department, and students have been involved in many initiatives and outreach activities within the community and beyond.

[Links with Amnesty International, United Nations, Hope Not Hate and Anti-Slavery Commissioner](#)

As part of their studies on human rights the Year 10 GCSE classes enjoyed a visit from *Amnesty International*. Students learned about how the organisation works to challenge human rights abuses around the world, and were invited to consider their own responsibilities in what they buy and where they shop.



Year 8 have also been studying human rights, and the current refugee crisis. They produced posters, art work and poems which Mrs Barkway sent off to the *United Nations*. The UN was so impressed with the work the children produced that they put it all on the UN website to show the work of our school.

Year 8 then went on to study modern day slavery. Mrs Barkway coordinated letters written by Year 8 students and sent them to the UK government's anti-slavery commissioner (Mr Kevin Hyland), asking what the UK does to protect people from being trafficked for exploitation. He was so impressed with the children's well informed questions that he has offered to come into school in the summer term to talk to Year 8 students.



Year 9 have been studying various topics relating to prejudice, discrimination, genocide and torture. Following a visit by Mrs Barkway and Mrs Kenton-Howells to *Hope Not Hate* schools' conference held in London during half term, the charity is hoping to visit Year 9 in the summer term.

## [Poland/Auschwitz and Huntingdonshire District Council Memorial Evening](#)



Following our visit to Auschwitz last summer with students from Years 9-13, we were invited to return to the annual Holocaust Memorial Service run by Huntingdonshire District Council. Students from Years 10, 11 and 12 addressed a gathering of local dignitaries in Huntingdon, including our MP Jonathan Djanogly, to tell them about Auschwitz and what they learned from

their visit there and meeting with a survivor. The students involved were excellent ambassadors for our school and related moving stories to the audience, asking them to consider what "never again" means in the 21st century.

## Visitor from Buddhist monastery: learning to meditate with a meditation teacher



Year 12 enjoyed a visit arranged by Mrs Clarke from a member of a local Buddhist monastery who talked with them about Buddhism. They will also have a visit from a meditation teacher, before they go on study leave, to teach them the art of meditation in the Buddhist tradition. Both of these visits compliment their studies for the Buddhism A Level paper.

## Trip to Funeral Directors and the Spiritualist Church

As a part of their studies on death, Year 13 visited a local Funeral Directors. They spent time looking around the funeral home, learning about the work of a funeral directors and then discussing death, bereavement, mourning rituals and cultural variations. This was a unique and fascinating opportunity.



The students also gave up one of their Saturday nights to visit the local St. Ives Spiritualist Church with their teachers, to meet with clairvoyants who believe they communicate with the deceased. Some very interesting and balanced discussions followed our visit.

## Food Bank

Students in Key Stage 3 and 4 have been studying poverty and citizenship, and have collected for the local Food bank which is held at All Saints Church. At different times over the past two terms students have visited the church in their Ethics lessons to learn about the food bank and make their own donations to support local people.



## Visit to Church, and visits from a Vicar and Curate



GCSE and A Level students have visited the local church to learn about its architecture, history, and significance as a place of worship. They enjoyed the visits and the opportunity to see faith in action.

The students of our eight GCSE and A Level classes and the whole of Year 8 too, have enjoyed various visits to school from the parish priest and the curate. They have discussed ethical issues and other topics on their exam syllabus relating to belief and Ethics. Year 8 learned about the significance of Easter to Christians, and considered if Britain was a Christian country. Year 7 enjoyed visits from the Gideons who talked about their faith and why they hand out free Bibles to people. Year 7 asked excellent questions.

## Indian Exchange

The final part of Year 7 infoskills portfolio involved research using different mediums for the **RE Hajj project**. Students gathered information from books, websites, an animation and an interview culminating in a ‘**mini Hajj**’, following the route taken during the pilgrimage with models of sacred landmarks along the way. The research provoked empathy in order to answer the question “**What would a Muslim miss if they didn’t go on Hajj?**” Year 7 students are now expert at finding resources themselves; extracting information and using a variety of sources to give depth to their research, as well as acknowledging their sources. ## DT Engineering Education Scheme

St Ivo's six Year 12 Engineers - Adam, Seb, Niks, George, Jack and Ishmail - worked very hard on their 6 month project with sponsor company Webtec this year. They were very successful on the celebration and assessment day and were one of very few schools who were judged as '**Highly Commended**'. The judges complimented the team on their professionalism, as well as how clearly and confidently each team member presented their role in the project. During the day, there was hardly a moment when the team did not have interested mentors from engineering companies, students or teachers from other schools surrounding their display stand asking questions. It was a very busy day but the team worked together well and successfully completed the Engineering Education Scheme. They were also judged against the Crest Award criteria and all members achieved a Gold Crest Award for their hard work. The students also achieved the Industrial Cadets Gold Award. These 6<sup>th</sup> form boys were a credit to the school throughout this project and put a vast amount of work into ensuring they would be successful. They have learnt a lot about the stages involved in researching and designing an engineering concept as well as time keeping amongst other things. Huge congratulations should be passed onto them for all their achievements over the past 6 months.

## 2020 STEM Scholars Smallpiece STEM Day

St Ivo's continued participation in the 2020 STEM Scholars project has seen Year 9 students designing an eco-friendly building that collects and uses its own water. They incorporated a filtration system, moisture sensor and pump into their building to ensure that water can be cleanly supplied to the rest of the building. Twenty students have now been selected as STEM Scholars and invited to take on a challenge with their parents - cracking a code and developing a structure that could safely deactivate a suspicious device!

# Languages News

## Spelling Bee

Once again this year St Ivo Languages Department entered all of Year 7 for the Foreign Languages Spelling Bee. This national competition is for students in Year 7 who are beginners in a foreign language. By taking part pupils practise and improve their vocabulary, spelling, pronunciation and memory skills in French and German. In September all 297 pupils practised translating and spelling a list of fifty words using their French and German alphabets. At the next stage of the competition, ten class champions were chosen, and from these ten we selected four school champions. At each stage of the competition a further 50 words were added.



Our finalists had to learn 150 words, as well as be able to translate and spell them against the clock. Emily, Teodora and Davina represented St Ivo School at the Eastern Region Finals in Peterborough. The pupils were well prepared, having shown the dedication to practise at lunchtimes in the languages department as well as at home. The standard was high – it was a pleasure to see these talented Year 7 linguists compete. It was a close run competition, and we did not make it to the National Finals this time. However the pupils left with their heads held high and their school is very proud of them indeed! A big thank you and well done from the Languages Department to all Year 7s who took part - especially our finalists.



## Year 9 Cologne Trip

On the May bank holiday weekend, a group of forty Year 9 pupils travelled with the Languages Department to Germany. After an early start, we arrived in the beautiful historical centre of Cologne. Our first stop was Lindt. Although a Swiss company, the chocolate is actually produced in Germany. The pupils saw chocolate in production, learnt about the history of chocolate and got to sample the real thing fresh from production. Next we visited **Cologne's Roman Catholic Gothic Cathedral** – a list of superlatives would hardly do this justice. After a panoramic cruise along the Rhine, we were exhausted and ready for bed!

After a day of culture, day two was all about fun. We spent the day at Phantasialand Theme Park. On day three we visited Aachen (the westernmost city in Germany). The Unesco world heritage town is steeped in history, formerly the residence of Charlemagne, and, from 936 to 1531, the place where 31 Holy Roman Emperors were crowned.

Following the Cambridgeshire Finals of the Dragons' Apprentice Challenge, held at The Junction in Cambridge on Thursday, 27 April, I am pleased to announce that St Ivo School Business & Economics Department had two winning teams from Year 12.

The Dragons' Apprentice Challenge is an enterprise scheme run for Sixth Form students in association with the Cambridge Centre for Voluntary Service (CCVS). The challenge provides a platform linking students from schools and colleges with local businesses and local charities/community groups. It offers Year 12 students the opportunity to experience setting up and running a business, gaining organisational and job related skills and learning about the work and beneficiaries of their designated charity. When the challenge commences teams of young people are matched with a local charity or community group and a local business mentor (their dragon). Their challenge is to "turn £100 in to £1,000 or more" for their charity/community organisation.

Students met their 'dragons' from Deloitte at the end of October where they also met their charities and began thinking of ways to generate funds in an enterprising way. Our students have organised baked sales, discos, sold pancakes and even some handmade candles in vintage tea cups – really tapping into a recent trend. For the finals of the competition, held to celebrate the success of all participants, the teams had to display how they made their project work and face up to the challenging questions posed by the judging panel of 'Super Dragons'.
