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Dear Parent / Carer

This is the first newsletter since we started our designation as a Humanities College. This has already had a big impact with class sizes being reduced in year 7, more interactive whiteboards purchased, four Advanced Skills Teachers being appointed, significant work in raising environmental awareness amongst students and our local history links have been developed further. In addition we are having a major focus on literacy standards across the school.

Whilst all this is exciting for the school, examination results remain our bread and butter. You will be aware of the problems associated with the SATs in the summer and we are still awaiting news of the re-marks we have requested. The validity of the Year 9 SATs have been questioned increasingly in recent years and **so I welcome the Government's decision to abolish them though I was surprised by it, particularly that it would be with immediate effect!** Over the next few weeks we will be deciding what our response to this will be as we will need to **ensure that Year 9's momentum isn't affected by this decision and also make sure that we generate the information which we need to track pupil progress during this important year.**

Our GCSE results were very pleasing and demonstrated the best pupil progress the school has achieved. We could have expected 63% of Year 11 to achieve 5+A*-C grades had progress been at the usual level for the school so I was delighted when over 70% achieved this important benchmark. In addition, nineteen out of twenty six GCSE subjects achieved progress scores which put them in the top 25% of schools nationally. An excellent performance which reflected a lot of hard work from pupils and staff as well as support from parents.

A level results were outstanding with the progress made by the pupils from GCSE to A level in the top 10% of schools nationally. This is the second consecutive year this has happened and last year placed us second in the County for pupil **progress at A level. This year's league table hasn't been produced yet.**

So all in all it is an exciting time for the school and we hope to make further progress over this academic year. Thank you for all your support.

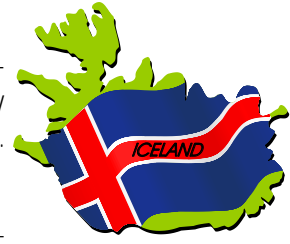
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Geography Department News

Over half term a group of twenty four students will be heading off to South Africa. This visit will include Johannesburg, Soweto, the Kruger National Park, the Transvaal and parts of Swaziland, looking at the wildlife as well as the fantastic geography of the country.

Eco-Schools



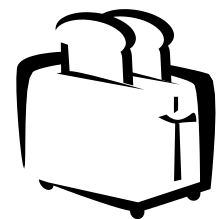
A lot has been happening on the Eco-Schools front this half term.

Dear Parents/Carers

St Ivo School Election of Parent Governors

The governing body of St Ivo School has two parent governor vacancies. We are writing to you to ask if you would be interested in becoming a school governor.

Governors are responsible for strategic planning and finance. They help to appoint our staff and to build good relationships between the school, parents and our local community. Our parent governors are very valuable members of the governing body and we rely on them to help us to keep in touch with what parents are thinking. They are on the governing body as representative parents, but they are not delegates and other parents cannot mandate them on how they should vote.

Governors do not need to be experts to tackle the range of responsibilities expected of them. Help, advice and training are available from various sources. If you are interested in the education of your child and the way the school makes decisions and have some time to commit to this role we would like you to consider becoming a parent governor. If you would like more information please contact the school and we can put you in touch with a member of our governing body for an informal chat.

Anyone who has parental responsibility for a pupil on the school roll at the time of the election can stand for election, can nominate someone for election and can vote in the election. A parent who works for the school for 500 hours or more or a parent who is an elected member of the local authority (County Councillor) is not eligible to stand for election but they are permitted to nominate and vote. If insufficient parents stand for election the governing body can appoint nominated parents to the governing body. The term of office for a parent governor is four years.

All nominations should be sent in to the school office by **4.00pm on Wednesday, 12 November**. You will need a proposer and a seconder. Every nomination must be countersigned by the candidate stating that they are willing to stand. We also need a few words about the candidate and why they would like to be a governor. If you would like extra copies of the nomination forms please contact the school office.

On **Monday, 17 November** we will inform parents about the details of parent governor nominations. If an election is necessary we will send ballot forms home with the children with the names of the candidates and their details. Each parent will have **two** votes as there are two vacancies, irrespective of the number of children he/she has at the school. The ballot is secret and you can send or post the ballot paper back in a sealed envelope, or drop it into the ballot box outside the school office. All votes must be in by **12.00 noon on Tuesday, 25 November** when they will be counted.

A copy of the rules guiding the election of parent governors and further copies of the nomination form can be obtained from the school office.
